

New Child Care Spaces

Bluewater District School Board joined MPP Bill Walker, upper and lower tier municipal partners, child care representatives, and media for a [virtual announcement](#) on January 27, 2022 regarding the Ontario government's investment of \$600,000 to create 39 child care spaces at St. Edmunds Public School in Tobermory. Funded through the province's Early Years Capital Program, the project will include one toddler room and one preschool room to support families on the Bruce Peninsula.



Capital Priorities Update

Business cases were submitted last year through the Ministry of Education's 2021-22 Capital Priorities Program for replacement elementary schools in Dundalk (JK-8 with child care spaces), Kincardine (JK-6 with child care spaces), and Owen Sound (Hillcrest Elementary School, JK-8). Though these business cases were not approved for 2021-22, our board recently resubmitted through the 2022-23 Capital Priorities Program the replacement elementary school cases for Dundalk and Kincardine. An 'Approval To Proceed' has also been submitted to the ministry for a scope change to increase the number of student spaces from 236 to 328 when building a replacement for Beavercrest Community School.

Secondary Laptop Investment

To further support online learning, a greater need for technology among families, and new secondary online credit requirements, Bluewater District School Board recently announced a [1:1 laptop allocation investment](#) for all Grades 9 to 12 students. In February, current Grades 9 to 11 students were provided with individual laptops to support their learning. The next phase of distribution is slated for this September when each incoming Grade 9 student will receive a laptop to coincide with their entry into secondary school.
